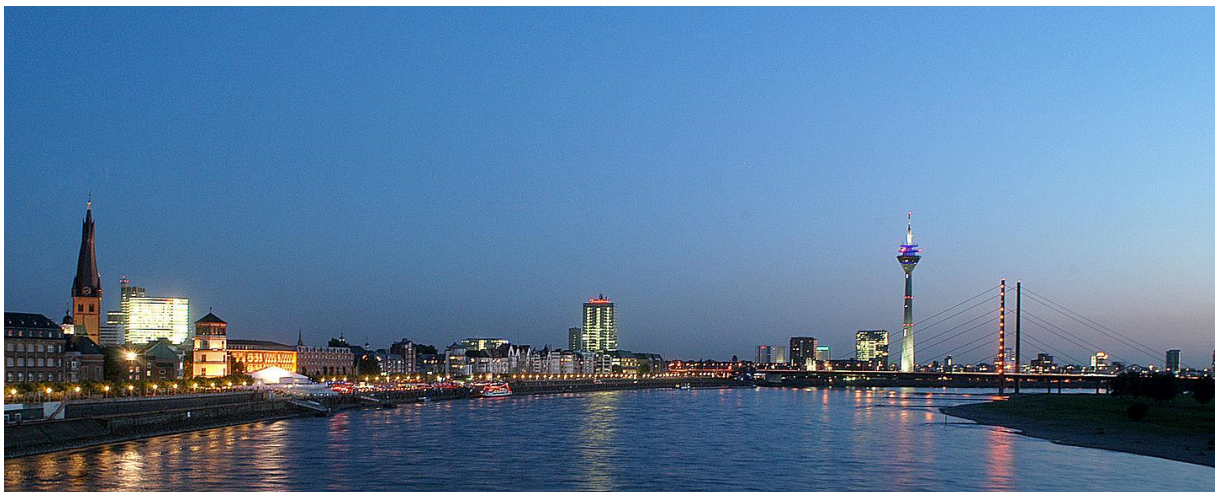

ISSUES AND PROCESSES OF THE SEMINAR

Peace is a question of humanity's survival, as are justice and preservation of the planet. In a time of multiple conflicts and violence in private, social and global relationships, all human beings are called to investigate the causes of conflict, to recognize violence and to promote peace. Religions in particular are called upon to stand up against evil, injustice, violence and abuse of power and to become actively involved in peacebuilding.

Conflicts understood as opposing interests and goals – quite often connected with claims of power – have always been part of human history and still are. However, in a differentiating and globalised world, they can multiply and become fuel for social and political abuse. This can then lead to feelings of insecurity, not infrequently to quarrels and violence. Conflicts can be experienced as existential threats and are often associated with violent emotions such as fear, anger and hatred. Such feelings arise when people's needs are not recognised, when one-sided interests are pushed through, when injustice occurs and a sense of powerlessness spreads. In order to be able to work constructively on conflicts, it is therefore necessary to reflect on how oneself is entangled in the conflict and in which areas one might even be stimulating them. How can we contribute to create a balance of different interests and needs,

and how can emotions be transformed in order to enable profound changes of relationships, positions of power, interests and modes of communication to take place. The aim is to promote mutual recognition, respect and appreciation.

There are a variety of conflict resolution models used to help overcome violent confrontations and to enable of sharing of power. In this seminar we want to get to know, practise and explore the approach of *Systemic Conflict Transformation* - a holistic method in conflict management. It asks about the emergence of conflicts, analyses their dynamics and works to balance conflicting interests and transform conflict feelings into feelings of solution, so that mutual recognition and appreciation can grow. In the Seminar we want to investigate at which points of care and counselling in different cultural and religious contexts the approach of *Systemic Conflict Transformation* can become helpful.

In some *workshops* with cases from different areas (family - societies - religious and ideological references) we want to test, practice and check the working methods of the Systemic Conflict Transformation. A detailed introduction to this method will be given in a presentation. In lectures we want to discuss how religious and nonreligious peacebuilding can be pursued.

In our daily devotions and prayers, we will experience how people with different religious and worldly views can join together in worship.

The seminar offers a space for open discourse and fruitful exploration, in order to experience a "spirituality of appreciation", which is useful for care and counselling in diverse contexts.

The languages of the Seminar are English and German.

Translation will be provided.

The Seminar is acknowledged as formal educational activity.

All participants will receive a certificate of attendance from SIPCC, which is as tax free charitable organisation, whose aim is to "promote the education of adults and students" (as is stated by the finance authority).

DÜSSELDORF

The elegant lively town on the Rhine is renowned for fashion, shopping, culture and unusual events. The Königsallee, known as the Kö, is one of the most luxurious shopping boulevards in Europe. It is not far from the historical old part of the city, which has around 260 bars and restaurants. The old town is known worldwide and is always lively. It offers many different events and exhibitions.



WORKING METHODS OF THE SEMINAR

The working methods of the Seminar are based on the identity of SIPCC as a network in which intercultural and interreligious pastoral practice, education and academic research and teaching are integrately linked and mutually enhance each other. Practicing counsellors, educators and teachers/researchers in academic fields are invited to exchange and learn together. Spiritual elements and ethical issues point to the fact that dealing with people happens holistically and always poses the question of what is good for humans.

Worship - prayers - devotion

During the seminars we can experience "Holy Moments", the spirituality of SIPCC, when we meet, reflect, listen to each other. In the morning we celebrate prayers - devotions together. They give the Seminar a spiritual framework and reveal similarities and differences between the different religions. They offer the possibility to come into relationship with oneself, the others and a force outside of oneself. They are designed by members of different denominations and religions. Openness of the participants to foreign traditions, rituals and symbols, a feeling for their own spiritual need and the willingness to be uncomfortable open spaces for spiritual experiences. There are different ways to participate in such a prayer: To be present and witness to this prayer; to join in as one wishes to do at that moment; to dare, receive and experience a common spirituality. (Responsible: *Ursula Harfst*).

Interreligious Forum: The forums introduce the theme of the day. They form an open space (similar to a "marketplace") for exchange of experiences, opinions and ideas using a narrative biographical approach. The core is telling about oneself. Some group-members from different faith traditions and worldviews introduce their personal experiences and opinions concerning the day's topic in the form of an interview. That will stimulate the plenary to talk about their own experiences, to express opinions and to come into contact with each other. The main focus will be to reflect on one's own peace-work.

Lectures and presentations give impetus to the respective topics of the day in the plenum and inspire discussions. Reflexions from different perspectives want to enhance the discussion.

Workshops

Three single workshops will be held on three afternoons in which care givers will present cases of conflicts from different contexts and areas. These cases can be discussed and reflected with the method of *Systemic Conflict Transformation*. Moderators who are trained in this method will facilitate the group. Presenters and moderators will discuss in advance how they will proceed and which method they will use.

The presenters of cases of conflict describe from their own perspective

- parties in the conflict (persons, groups, etc. with their interests and needs and their feelings);
- the own involvement, position and engagement in the conflict
- previous measures used to resolve the conflicts.

The moderators contact the presenters, to prepare the presentation and the conversation in the group. The first step in the workshop will be a "*conflict map*", to prepare the conflict-transformation. The presentation should be as short as possible is limited to max. 30 minutes to save enough time for discussion (time of the whole workshop 90 minutes).

Each day a "creative workshop" from acting, art and dance will be offered.

Reflection Groups

The reflection groups are a safe place, where the experiences of the day can be reflected and the following questions be discussed.:

- What was new, meaningful and important for me today concerning my own experiences of conflicts and violence?
- Were the contributions today helpful for my own work?

All group members are invited to participate in the discussion. The moderators will take care to ensure that all participants have enough space for their contributions.

As the groups work process-oriented, it is essential that the participants stay in the same group.

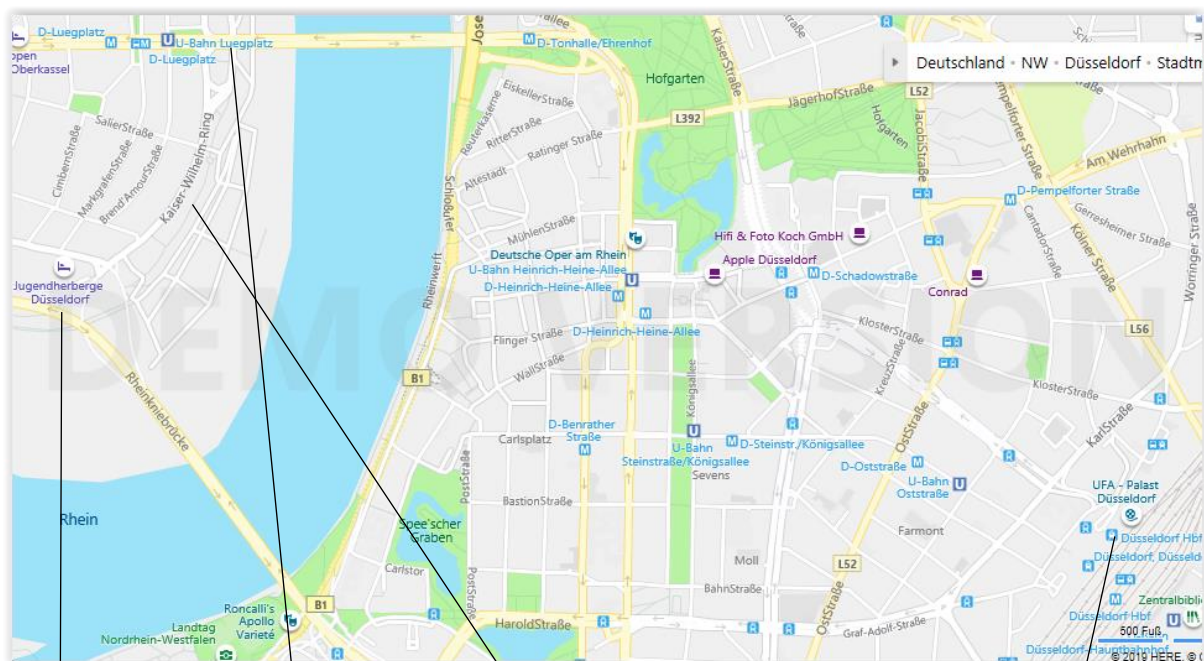
